Fiscal Year 2015—16 Budget Introduced

The Town introduced the Fiscal Year 2015-16 (FY16) Budget at the March 9th Town Council Meeting. The <u>Public Hearing is</u> <u>scheduled for Monday, April 13th, beginning at 7 pm</u>.

The FY16 Budget is available to view beginning on Page 8, and on the Town's website: www.tok.md.gov. The **Real Property Tax Rate** was recommended to remain at **\$0.136** per \$100 of assessed value; the **Personal Property Rate (Business)** was recommended to be increased from **\$0.62** to **\$0.65** per \$100 of assessed value; and the **Personal Property Utility Rate (Utility)** was recommended to be increased from **\$2.80** to **\$3.20** per \$100 of assessed value. The total operating budget for FY16 is expected to be \$2,846,583.

FROM MAYOR FOSSELMAN



Revitalization, Development . . . Where Are We?

I am often stopped while running errands around Town by residents asking about future development plans, and when they may happen. My response is that while revitalization doesn't happen overnight, we actually have experienced quite a bit of change over the last eight years; and that I am very excited about what is on the horizon for Kensington.

Upon taking office in 2006, following a promise of openness and revitalization, I envisioned a Kensington with a more viable town cen-

ter, dining and entertaining options, and most importantly, a pedestrian friendly community. Many of you shared this vision as well, which is what allowed us to begin the process of updating our 30 year old Master Plan with the blueprint for our future: The Kensington and Vicinity Sector Plan.

The necessity of updating the Master Plan was that while only thirty years old, it was developed upon an outdated zoning and land use strategy, especially for a semi-urban community such as ours. In addition, we had no zoning authority or say over what happened within Kensington, as we were at the mercy of the County's planners for any new development possibilities.

The good news is that we've been able to change this over the last eight years by lobbying the Maryland General Assembly, through our County and State Officials, by granting us quasizoning authority under Article 28 (Kensington and Takoma Park are the only two municipalities in the State to have this); thus allowing for a broader voice in land use decisions and the ability to develop a plan that will allow for greater mixed use zoning, open space, pedestrian access, and housing options.

Many of you may remember our lack of dining options just a few years ago . . . the main reason for this is that most restaurants are dependent upon the sale of alcohol to generate a profit, and with our liquor regulations as prohibitive as they were, it was very difficult to entice any new restaurants to open within the town. However, we were able to amend this law too, again with the support of our County and State Officials, and have since seen a number of existing restaurants receive liquor licenses, along with the addition of four new restaurants that serve beer, wine, and/or liquor.

While the physical development phase has yet to begin, the core areas of need are Connecticut, Metropolitan, and Howard Avenues. I have met with potential developers for each of these sites and believe the proposed projects meet the vision of the community, while maintaining Kensington's historical charm.

As with any re-development project, there are many hurdles to overcome, but overall, the process requires the cooperation from many parties, which is not always easy. While I hope to see these projects come to fruition very soon, I can promise that there will be an opportunity to allow for constructive comments prior to any final approval on any such projects.

TOWN MINUTES

January 12, 2015 Town Council Summary

• Approved the Town Council Minutes from December 8, 2014.

• Approved Resolution No. R-01-2015 - A Resolution updating the Town's schedule of charges, expenses, and fees.

• Approved Resolution No. R-02-2015 - A Resolution authorizing the Town Manager to enter into a contract with Playground Specialists for the purchase and installation of new playground equipment at St. Paul Park.

January 12, 2015—Mayor Fosselman, Council Members Bartram, Furman, McMullen, and Sexton, Town Manager Daily, Assistant Town Manager Hoffman and Clerk-Treasurer Engels were present. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited and a Moment of Silence was observed for Town Attorney Ferguson's son.

The Minutes from the December 8, 2014 Town Meeting were approved. See Council Actions.

From the Mayor and Town Council -

Mayor Fosselman reminded Residents to clear the sidewalks in front of their homes of snow and ice within 24 hours of a storm; informed Residents that On The Purple Couch is collecting blankets and space heaters for A Wider Circle and will be distributed to families in need; attended swearing in for new Attorney General Brian Frosh; had coffee with Montgomery County Schools Superintendent Joshua Starr, and discussed rumors regarding redistricting of the Town, which were inaccurate, as the County is discussing redistricting boundaries for BCC because of the new middle school coming to Rock Creek Hills; the School Board is also studying high schools in the area to better utilize staffing resources;

and met with Residents on Kensington Historic Building Workshop, which will be held on January 31st from 9 to 1 at St. Paul's Church to identify uses and potential for Warner Circle, Kensington Cabin, and Noyes Library.

Council Member Sexton invited local business owners to attend the Wheaton-Kensington Chamber of Commerce business mixer on January 21st from 6 to 8 p.m. at Town Hall.

Council Member Furman reported she will be meeting with Maier Warner to discuss the changes to ExploreKensington.com. She noted they will also discuss the different mailing options for the recently completed Town Map project. She mentioned a parking issue during certain Town Hall events had been brought to her attention and suggested when events, such as the Bridge Tournament, will be in Town, to ask the Bridge Club to remind their members of parking concerns along residential streets. The Mayor also suggested the Town publicize to the surrounding neighbors when events will be in Town.

Council Member McMullen reported on the December 10th Traffic Committee meeting, and noted that the Fawcett Street petition was discussed. He stated that there was a misunderstanding between the business owners and the residents as to the purpose of the petition, and informed them both that parking restrictions will be enforced. The Committee is still waiting to hear back from the business community on how many parking spaces they believe would be adequate, to meet the demands of their patrons. The Town staff will be instructed to continue to enforce all restrictions within the area and the Traffic Committee will commence again on February 25th to discuss the situation, along with a number of other topics.

Council Member Bartram attended the Traffic Committee Meeting, and thanked everyone for a successful Menorah Lighting.

From the Public –

Jack Gaffey thanked the Mayor, Council, Staff, and Town Crew for their efforts in clearing the streets of the most recent snow storm. Mr. Gaffey also noted that the Comet LoveJoy would be visible over the next few nights.

Liz Brennan, Kensington Park Friends of the Library, discussed the pending renovations to the Kensington Park Library and noted that the construction will require the facility to temporarily close from April 1st through July 1st. The project will include a new elevator and a refresh of the building. Ms. Brennan also encouraged membership with the KPFOL, as they are looking to double their membership and help make a sizeable contribution for a café styled wifi area.

Ordinances, Resolutions, Regulations -

Resolution No. R-01-2015 – A Resolution updating the schedule of fees, charges and expenses was discussed. Town Manager Daily noted that the fee schedule is updated periodically to coincide with the local cost of living index. The Mayor noted the increases were nominal. There was no public comment. See Council Actions.

Resolution No. R-02-2015 – A Resolution authorizing the Town Manager to enter into a contract with Playground Specialists, Inc. for replacement at St. Paul Park was discussed. Town Manager Daily stated that proposals were received from various companies and that he was recommending the proposal by Playground Specialists based on their contract bid with Frederick County Public Schools. Mr. Daily also mentioned that Playground Specialists had been working directly with a number of Town Residents to design a park that was more inclusive of the community. The Mayor noted Section 2-403 of the Town Code authorizes the Town to piggy-back on an existing governmental contract, as long as they have similar purchasing requirements. He also suggested that in the future the Town should still publicize that they are accepting proposals for major projects.

Council Member Furman expressed support of the proposed projects and thanked the group of Residents working with Playground Specialists for their efforts.

Lauren Dworken stated that "Freddy the Fire Truck" will be outfitted with a #5 on it to match Station 5 of the Kensington Volunteer Fire Department. See Council Actions.

Council Actions –

Council Member Furman moved to approve the Minutes from the December 8, 2014 Town Meeting. The motion passed unanimously.

Council Member McMullen moved to adopt Resolution No. R-01-2015 updating a schedule of fees, charges, and expenses as provided for in the ordinances of the Town of Kensington. The motion passed unanimously. Council Member Furman moved to adopt Resolution No. R-02-2015 authorizing the Town Manager to enter into a contract with playground Specialists to install playground equipment at St. Paul Park. The motion passed unanimously.

Council Member Sexton moved to adjourn the meeting at 7:40 pm. The motion passed unanimously.

From the Mayor and Town Council -

Mayor Fosselman reported he attended the Maryland Mayors Association conference and was confirmed as the next President of the Association; met with a number of apartment Residents, along with Council Member Furman and Asst. Town Manager Hoffman, to discuss parking and additional apartment specific issues. The Mayor stated that the meeting was very productive and that the Town will take steps to improve communication and clarity of our parking restrictions.

Council Member Bartram reported that he attended the Wheaton-Kensington Chamber of Commerce Business Mixer and has been reviewing a number of issues that were mentioned at the previous Traffic Committee meeting. Council Member McMullen reported that the Traffic Committee will convene on Wednesday, February 25th, 7 pm. The Agenda will be circulated in advance, but the meeting will focus on the following topics: parking on Fawcett and Howard; 3-way stop sign at Howard and Fawcett; parking regulations on Lexington Street; speed hump requests on Armory Avenue and Calvert Place.

Council Member Furman attended the Wheaton-Kensington Chamber of Commerce Business Mixer and noted that the Greenscape Committee will meet on February 24th (postponed until March 10th, 7 pm); requested that a future Town meeting discuss the benefits of a possible parking district.

Council Member Sexton thanked the Town for hosting the Wheaton-Kensington Chamber of Commerce Business Mixer; and thanked everyone for attending the Kensington Historical Building Workshop in cooperation with the Montgomery Parks Department. Council Member Sexton also noted the importance of the Town supporting the use of the historic buildings once the projects have been defined.

From the Town Manager and Staff

Town Manager Daily reported that he is working on the Fiscal Year 2016 Budget, which will focus heavily on street resurfacing, and will also include the replacement of the sidewalk along Kensington Parkway between Frederick Avenue and Kent Street.

Council Member McMullen suggested reconstructing the crosswalk that was between Clum Kennedy Park and the west side of Montgomery Avenue.

From the Public –

Julie O'Malley thanked the Town for cosponsoring the Kensington Historic Buildings

Workshop, and Council Members Furman and Sexton for their efforts. Ms. O'Malley noted that the County will be posting comments and suggested recommendations on their website and will schedule another meeting prior to addressing the Planning Board.

Jack Gaffey thanked Council Member Furman for arranging the Historic Buildings Workshop, and was appreciative that Kensington Cabin Park was included within the discussion, which he stated has been closed since 1997. Mr. Gaffey also thanked the Town crew for their efforts during the most recent snow.

Ordinances, Resolutions, Regulations -

Resolution No. R-03-2015 – A Resolution confirming the appointment of David Beaudet and David Weeda to the Town Ethics Commission for two year terms was presented. The Commission's third member, Jack Gaffey, was appointed previously. There was no public comment. See Council Actions.

Resolution No. R-04-2015 – A Resolution confirming the appointment of Martha Deale, Spencer Harrill, and Jennifer Smith to the Board of Supervisors of Election for the term of one year was presented. The Mayor thanked long-serving member Robin Watson for her service and noted that she intends to volunteer again in the future with the Board of Elections. There was no public comment. See Council Actions.

Ordinance No. O-03-2015—Ordinance of the Mayor and Council of the Town of Kensington amending Chapter II "Government and Administration", Article I "Town Offices and Procedures" by establishing Sections 2-113 "Compensation of the Council" and 2-114 "Compensation of the Mayor", to provide for compensation of the Mayor and Council as authorized by Sections 404 and 504 of the Town Charter.

ORDINANCE No. 0-01-2015

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING THE TOWN OPERATING AND CAPITAL BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2015-16 AND LEVYING A TAX ON ALL ASSESS-ABLE PROPERTY WITHIN THE TOWN OF KENSINGTON, MARYLAND

WHEREAS, the proposed budget for the Fiscal Year, beginning July 1, 2015 and ending June 30, 2016 must be submitted to the Town Council on or before the third Monday in April; and

WHEREAS, the proposed budget ordinance must be introduced at a meeting of the Mayor and Town Council to allow for timely notice as required by the Town Charter and establish a public hearing on said Budget Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the Fiscal Year 2015-16 Proposed Budget provides a complete financial plan, including anticipated revenues and proposed expenditures, for the fiscal year.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the Town of Kensington, in public meeting assembled, that the budget for the Town of Kensington for Fiscal Year 2016, beginning July 1, 2015 and ending June 30, 2016, be and it is hereby introduced and to be adopted as follows:

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that all of the sums set forth herein under the heading "EXPENDITURES" be and hereby are appropriated.

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that there is hereby levied on all of the assessable real property within the Town a tax at the rate of:

<u>Real Property:</u> Thirteen and 6/10 Cents (\$0.136) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100) of assessed value of said property.

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED and there is hereby levied a tax on all personal property subject to taxation by the Town, at the rate of:

<u>Personal Property:</u> Sixty-Five cents (\$0.65) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100) of assessed value on the following personal property subclasses as authorized in § 8-101 of the Tax- Property Article, Annotated Code of Maryland: stock in business, distilled spirits, operating personal property of a railroad and all other personal property directed by said article to be assessed, with the exception that there is hereby levied a tax of **Three dollars and twenty cents (\$3.20)** on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100) of assessed value on the following personal property subclasses as set forth in § 8-101 of the Tax- Property Article, Annotated Code of Maryland:

1. operating personal property of a public utility that is machinery or equipment used to generate electricity or steam for sale; and

2. all other operating personal property of a public utility; and

3. machinery and equipment, other than operating personal property of a public utility, that is used to generate electricity or steam for sale or hot or chilled water for sale that is used to heat or cool a building.

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that the Council hereby adopts the imposition of a full year, one-half year, three-quarter year and one-quarter year tax levies authorized pursuant to §§ 10-102, 10-103, 10-104 and 10-105, Tax Property Article, Annotated Code of Maryland, as amended, and authorizes and empowers Montgomery County, Maryland, to collect and remit the same to the Town of Kensington, consistent with the imposition and collection of such levies on real property by Montgomery County.

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that the Town Council may from time to time transfer funds by Resolution within the Operating and Capital Improvements Budget categories.




2nd Annual Kensington Car Show
