Historic District properties will also require a Historic Area Work Permit (HAWP). Please contact the Town staff at 301-949-2424 with any questions.

The owl over the door at The Noyes Children's Library has been there since Noyes was built in 1893, on land donated by Kensington's founder, Brainard Warner. Along with the "NoYes"

> lettering, it's one of the storybook touches that makes this historic building so special to children!

> Noyes is the oldest public library in the Washington, DC area – older even that the Jefferson Building at the Library of Congress. Noyes was designated as a children's library by Montgomery County Public Libraries in 1972.

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Noyes Children's Library Foundation

In 2015, MCPL painted the Noyes Library's exterior. The Noyes Children's Library Foundation, a nonprofit founded in 1991 to support Noyes' early literacy mission, felt that the owl above the door also needed an update. Artist and designer, Gloria Capron, has lived and worked in historic Kensington for



over 40 years. Her three girls enjoyed growing up and learning to read at Noyes, so she volunteered to paint the owl. The result was a fabulous makeover! After the newly painted owl returned to its perch, the Foundation held a contest to name the owl. The winning name was "Pearl." Pearl was later joined by "Crosby," a carved owl commissioned by a Girl Scout Troop as their Cookie Money project, and created by Kensington resident and artist Jason Swain.



What's Next for Noyes?

Noyes has a fascinating history, but an even more exciting future! The Make MORE Noyes Renovation, planned and funded through a partnership between the Noyes Children's Library Foundation and Montgomery County, will transform the historic one-room Noyes Children's Library into three accessible floors, working within the 1893 footprint to create more space for young patrons and for early literacy programming and training.

After the Renovation, Noyes will become a regional and even national early literacy resource, training librarians, teachers and day care providers through the Jan Jablonski Early Literacy Training Center, while enabling young children to build the foundation for a lifelong love of books and reading.

The Noyes Children's Library Foundation is committed to raising \$1.6 million of the \$3.1 million renovation budget, with Montgomery County funding the balance of the project.

One of the best things about Noyes Library is how it has always brought the community together. Gloria Capron's work in painting the owl is another great example of this, as is the rousing support that the Noyes Children's Library Foundation receives from the Town of Kensington and from so many residents. 

Plant Notes

What do gardeners do in the winter? We spend a lot of time browsing through seed catalogues looking for vegetable and flower seeds to grow. If you want to plant lettuce or spinach, the seeds should probably go in the ground in March as these plants stop producing in the hot weather, usually by the middle of May. Some varieties of lettuce to try in this warm climate are: Little Gem, Black Seeded Simpson and Green Salad Bowl.



Things to look out for: Winter aconite blooms, pictured at right, in late winter and can often be seen as early as January. There's a huge patch of winter aconite on the west side of the Circle Manor grounds.

What to do with your amaryllis: It's worth a try to get these to come back next winter, although this doesn't always work. Leave the leaves alone, cut back the finished flower stalks to the base, and put the plant in the pot in a cool place. Water it once a week but don't let it sit in water. In late April you can take the whole pot outside and put it somewhere in the shade. In the fall, in mid to late October, cut the leaves back to the base and bring the pot back inside to a cool place. In about mid-November give it a little water and a green shoot should soon appear. Now bring it up into a sunny window and it should bloom.

What to Do With All That Snow



The Town requires all of our residents and businesses to clear a path on the sidewalk in front of their property within 24 hours of each snow fall.

If a path has not been cleared within 24 hours, a notice will be sent to the resident or business reminding them that the sidewalk needs to be cleared. If a path has not been cleared within 24 hours of the notice, a municipal infraction will be issued — \$65 for residential and \$195 for businesses. Please do not pile snow blocking pedestrian walkways at intersections.

Exceptions: residential sidewalks located on Connecticut, Knowles and Summit Avenues, and the 3400 & 3500 block of University Blvd. will be cleared by the Town.

If you are traveling during the winter months, please make arrangements to have someone clear your sidewalk in your absence.

"Votes For Women!!"

'Votes For Women' – the prevalent rallying cry by suffragists during the Women's Suffrage movement will once again be a common theme this year. The Town of Kensington, along with the Law Theater Project, and the Bethesda Writer's Center, will celebrate the Centennial of Women's Suffrage through the ratification of the Nineteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution (August 18, 1920). In celebration of the anniversary of Women receiving the right to vote in all elections within the United States, Project 2020: Votes For Women, will provide educational related forums, along with stage play events.

Calls for Plays and other Creative Works are hereby issued!!

In preparation of the anticipated stage events, we are looking for volunteers, actors, playwrights, writers, artists, and participants to help bring these events to fruition. If you are interested in helping celebrate and honor the Women's Suffrage movement, please email <u>Town@TOK.md.gov</u>.

The House of Representatives passed the Amendment on May 21, 1919 and the Senate followed on June 4, 1919. Women's Suffrage formally became a Constitutional Right under the Nineteenth Amendment when Tennessee became the 36th state to ratify the Amendment on August 18, 1920. However, many women were still prevented from exercising their newfound Constitutional Right until 1965 due to voter suppression, when the Voting Rights Act was signed into law on August 6, 1965 prohibiting racial discrimination in voting.



We look forward to celebrating the Centennial of the passage of the Nineteenth Amendment, while reflecting on the hard-fought achievement for all Women as they strived to receive recognition of their right for equal participation in Federal, State, and local political elections through the social process.

- Approved the Town Meeting Minutes of November 18, 2019.
- Reviewed the proposed Alcohol Legislation bill (MC 15-20) to amend the Town's Alcohol laws with certain conditions. The Council will provide additional comments to Town staff by December 18, 2019.
- Acknowledged receipt of the Audit Committee's Report for Fiscal Year 2018-2019 (FY19).
- Accepted the Development Review Board (DRB) Guidelines as a formal document.
- Continued Ordinance No. O-03-2019 An Ordinance Amending Chapter VI, Article 1, "Signs and Solicitors", Sections 6-101, "Signs"; 6-102, "Town Sign Permit Required"; 6-103, "Signs in the Public Right of Way"; 6-104 "Signs on Private Property – CRT, CRN and Industrial Zones"; and 6-106, "Enforcement and Penalties" to identify the types of signs that are authorized and are required to be permitted; expand the prohibition on pole signs; to regulate limited duration signs on private property; to clarify that all illuminated signs are regulated in the same manner and to make conforming changes. The

Council will provide additional comments to the Town staff by December 18, 2019 for review at the January 13, 2020 Council Meeting.




