Gardening in Kensington

We have many avid gardeners in Kensington. Whether you've been gardening for years or are starting your first garden, volunteer Mongomery County Master Gardeners are available to help you. We are excited to be returning to the Kensington Farmers' Market for the second and fourth Saturdays, April-October.

Master Gardeners are volunteers trained by the University of Maryland Extension. Visit *Extension.umd. edu/programs/environment-natural-resources/program-areas/home-and-garden-informationcenter/master-gardener-program*. We have plant clinics throughout the county to answer your questions about pruning, vegetables, insects, lawns, trees and shrubs and more. We can help identify which plants are most likely to thrive under the conditions in your yard (sunny, shady, wet, dry, deer problems and other factors). You can also bring plant samples and photos for identification or diagnosis. Slots to work at the Kensington Plant Clinic fill very quickly each year because of the many friendly and interesting people who visit with us.

Our Water Supply and Drainage Conditions in Your Yard

This year we will also feature the Bay-Wise Master Gardener Program. Visit *Extension.umd.edu/ programs/environment-natural-resources/program-areas/bay-wise-program*. One of the areas of concern often cited by Kensington residents in the Sustainable Kensington survey is our watershed. All of our waterways eventually drain into the Chesapeake Bay. How we maintain our landscapes can affect the health of our waterways.

Bay-Wise Master Gardeners are especially trained to look at the movement of water in your yard and how to most effectively control erosion and unfiltered runoff. We can also discuss ways you can encourage wildlife, the use of native plants, how to mulch appropriately, composting, your lawn, and integrated pest management.

Do you know that in Kensington it is not legal to have the drainage from your property piped into the street? Our stormwater system is not designed to handle this amount of water. In addition, when the water is absorbed in your property there is some natural filtering before it enters local waterways.

If you are interested in improving water conditions in your yard or incorporating more sustainable practices in what you already do, stop by our Bay-Wise table. We'll tell you what you can do, how to apply for a free consultation and get a certification sign for your yard.

We can also tell you about County rebates for Rain Gardens, Conservation Landscapes, Water Harvesting (Rain Barrels) and Permeable Pavement. The county has many free resources to help you improve how you manage your property and our natural resources. We invite you to take advantage of them!



Clean Energy for the Community



Warner Memorial Presbyterian Church won the Renewable Role Model Award from Interfaith Power & Light in their Cool Congregations Challenge for developing a Community Solar project with newly installed solar on the roof of their facility whose output exceeded their needs, so they've been able to provide electricity at reduced rates to a neighboring non-profit housing program and a number of local families.

Warner Memorial's story:

Several years ago, we had a dream and a challenge. Our dream was to replace the electricity we were getting



from PEPCO (our electricity supplier) with cleanly generated electricity, and by our example, encourage others to do the same. Being a PC(USA) Earth Care Congregation, we are committed to environmental stewardship, but nothing seemed financially feasible.

In 2017, Warner helped form the National Capital Presbytery Youth Carbon Analyst Program, which brought together high school youth to be leaders in energy transformation in congregations. In 2020 they made presentations on rooftop solar generation. Profiles of several local churches were presented, including an analysis of Warner Memorial. The analysis showed that our roof could

generate twice the energy we need! Then we consulted with Lumina Solar (who eventually installed the system) and replaced our aging roof.

Thanks to a webinar sponsored by the Interfaith Power & Light DMV affiliate covering DC, Maryland, and Northern Virginia, we learned about upcoming legislation that would make the existing Community Solar pilot a permanent program. In Maryland's program, the owner/lessor can use up to half of the electricity generated, and the other half is made available to subscribers in the community. We also learned about funding possibilities through the Montgomery County Green Bank.

We contacted Cindy McCabe at the Montgomery County Green Bank. She approached a solar energy developer, Skyview Ventures, who was eager to begin working with nonprofit organizations and was willing to take on a small project like ours. She helped us develop a Community Solar program, with financing from the Montgomery County Green Bank for Skyview Ventures. Our church's Earth Stewardship Team shepherded a contract with Skyview Ventures through all the required approvals and negotiated a rate reduction averaging 27%.

We could have taken most of this rate reduction for our own use. However, we instead chose to use the average reduction (27%) only for Warner Memorial's half of the generated electricity and to offer a smaller rate reduction (10%) to three member-households for access to one-quarter of the electricity. This enabled us to pass along a large rate reduction (44%) on the remaining electricity produced to Housing Unlimited, a non-profit that seeks to provide affordable housing to very low-income adults in mental health recovery in Montgomery County. Our Community Solar project connected to the grid on November 17, 2023. Warner expects to use only 41,150 kWh of the total 82,300 kWh we expect to produce annually, and to provide 20,000kWh to Housing Unlimited at a 44% discount.

This experience brought together diverse stakeholders, including a church, a social-service non-profit organization, a county-backed financial institution, and a private developer - all working towards a common goal of caring for the environment and one another. The collaboration yields two benefits: it replaces carbon-intensive electricity with carbon-free solar, and it provides electricity at a reduced cost for our church building and for financially pressed members of our community. We hope to be an example to other organizations and an inspiration to leaders adopting clean energy strategies.

> Budget Ordinance No. O-02-2024 Introduced: March 20, 2024 Public Hearing: April 10, 2024 Adopted:

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND TOWN COUNCIL OF KENSINGTON TO APPROPRIATE AND ADOPT THE FISCAL YEAR 2024 – 2025 (FY25) BUDGET AND TO LEVY A TAX ON CERTAIN REAL AND PERSONAL PROPERTY UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF §6-203 OF THE TAX-PROPERTY ARTICLE OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND, AS AMENDED.

WHEREAS, §5-205 et seq. of the Local Government Article, Annotated Code of Maryland, authorizes the Mayor and Town Council to provide for the control and management of its finances and expend money for any public purpose and for the safety, health, and general welfare of the Town and its occupants; and

WHEREAS, §6-203 of the Tax-Property Article, of the Annotated Code of Maryland (as amended), grants authority to municipal corporations to levy a tax on personal property, land, and improvements thereon, within the municipal corporation; and

WHEREAS, Article VIII, "Finance", Section 801, "Fiscal Year", of the Town Charter states that the Fiscal Year of the Town shall begin on July 1, 2024, and end on June 30, 2025; and

WHEREAS, Section 802, "Proposed Budget", of the Town Charter states that the Town Manager shall submit to the Council prior to the third Monday in April, a Budget of anticipated revenues, proposed operating expenditures, and proposed capital project expenditures, along with a written financial plan for the succeeding fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, Section 803, "Adoption", of the Town Charter states that prior to adopting the Budget, the Council shall hold a public hearing following due notice and a favorable vote of at least a majority of the total elected membership of the Council shall be necessary for adoption.

NOW THEREFORE, the Mayor and Town Council of Kensington does hereby adopt the following Budget Ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE TO APPROPRIATE AND ADOPT THE FISCAL YEAR 2024 – 2025 (FY25) BUDGET AND TO LEVY A TAX ON CERTAIN REAL AND PERSONAL PROPERTY UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF §6-203 OF THE TAX-PROPERTY ARTICLE OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND, AS AMENDED.

BE IT ORDAINED AND ORDERED this day of May, 2024, by the Kensington Town Council, acting under and by virtue of the authority granted to it by §5-205 *et seq.* of the Local Government Article, Annotated Code of Maryland, and Article VIII of the Kensington Town Charter, that the budget for Fiscal Year July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference, be and the same hereby is appropriated and adopted.

SECTION 2:

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED AND ORDERED, this day of May, 2024, by the Kensington Town Council, acting under the virtue of the authority granted to it by §6-203 of the Tax-Property Article, of the Annotated Code of Maryland (as amended), and Article VIII of the Kensington Town Charter, hereby levies a tax at the rate of One thousand, three hundred twelve ten-thousandths cents **(\$0.1312)** per One Hundred Dollars of full value assessment on all taxable **Real Property** located within the corporate limits of the Town of Kensington.

SECTION 3:

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED AND ORDERED, this day of May, 2024, by the Kensington Town Council, acting under the virtue of the authority granted to it by §6-203 of the Tax-Property Article, of the Annotated Code of Maryland (as amended), and Article VIII of the Kensington Town Charter, hereby levies a tax at the rate of eighty cents **(\$0.80)** per One Hundred Dollars of full value assessment on all taxable **Personal Property** located within the corporate limits of the Town of Kensington.

SECTION 4:

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED AND ORDERED, this day of May, 2024, by the Kensington Town Council, acting under the virtue of the authority granted to it by §8-101 of the Tax-Property Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland (as amended), and Article VIII of the Kensington Town Charter, hereby levies a tax at the rate of five dollars **(\$5.00)** per One Hundred Dollars of full value assessment on all taxable **Personal Property** set forth by §8-101 of the Tax-Property Article, of the Annotated Code of Maryland (as amended):

- 1. Operating personal property of a railroad;
- 2. Operating personal property of a public utility that is machinery or equipment used to generate electricity or steam for sale;
- 3. All other operating personal property of a public utility; and
- 4. Machinery and equipment, other than operating personal property of a public utility, that is used to generate electricity or steam for sale or hot or chilled water for sale that is used to heat or cool a building.

SECTION 5:

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED AND ORDERED, this day of May, 2024, by the Kensington Town Council, hereby adopts the imposition of a full-year, one-half year, three-quarter year, and one-quarter year tax levies, authorized pursuant to §10-102, 10-103, 10-104, and 10-105 of the Tax-Property Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland (as amended), and authorizes and empowers Montgomery County, Maryland, to collect and remit the same to the Town of Kensington, consistent with the imposition and collection of such levies on real property by Montgomery County.

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED AND ORDERED, this day of May, 2024, by the Kensington Town Council that the transfer of funds by Resolution within the Operating and Capital Improvements Budget may occur.

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED AND ORDERED, this day of May, 2024, by the Kensington Town Council, acting under and by virtue of the authority granted to it by §5-201 *et seq.* of the Local Government Article, Annotated Code of Maryland, and Article VI, "Powers of the Council", Section 601, "General Powers" of the Town Charter that:

(1) If any part of provision of this ordinance is declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, the part of provision held to be invalid shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any remaining part thereof; and

(2) This ordinance shall take effect on the 1st day of July, 2024, provided the following:

- (a) Posted at Town Hall by the next business day following introduction; and
- (b) Posted on the official Town website; and
- (c) Sent to those persons listed on the official Town email list/mail subscription service; and
- (d) Published once prior to the public hearing in the Town newsletter or sent by substitute regular mail to newsletter circulation addresses.

Envisioning the Summit Avenue Extension

Summit Avenue runs along the Town of Kensington's western edge. Starting at the branch with Cedar Lane, it is a two-lane, residential arterial road until it intersects

Knowles Avenue. North of Knowles Avenue, it transitions to a two-lane business district street until terminating at Plyers Mill Road north of the CSX tracks.

The original Kensington-Wheaton Master Plan, adopted in 1970, included a planned extension of Summit Avenue north from Plyers Mill Road to Farragut Avenue, where it meets Connecticut Avenue. The Montgomery County Council ultimately shelved the extension at that time for lack of feasibility and design analysis. Forty-two years later, the Summit Avenue Extension resurfaced as a priority project in the 2012 Kensington Sector Plan. As the project's lead sponsor, Montgomery County's Department of Transportation (MCDOT) has taken initial steps to study traffic patterns in the connecting and impacted intersections, and to plan and design the project. At present, the extension is at a 35% design stage. Below is a timeline of the project since its conceptualization in 1970.

The Summit Avenue Extension was originally proposed to alleviate traffic congestion and improve vehicle movement along the Connecticut Avenue corridor. However, since the 1970s, many things have changed. While traffic has increased to approximately 60,000 vehicle trips daily, Kensington and the surrounding area have evolved over the past decades through new development, and more shops, restaurants, and other businesses and amenities like a robust community art program and park system, all of which have helped to make the Town a destination, and not a just a town to pass through.

Along with the CSX tracks, the current configuration with Summit Avenue, Plyers Mill,

and Connecticut Avenue has contributed to the Town's bifurcation, limiting connectivity between Kensington (and many of its amenities) and the Ken-Gar neighborhood. Established in 1892, Ken-Gar is a historically Black community located just outside the Town of Kensington's northwestern boundary. A lack of government services in the community led Ken-Gar's residents to spend previous decades advocating to the County for decent roads, sidewalks, street lighting, and plumbing. Ken-Gar has a vibrant history as a tight-knit community with its own unique assets, including the Leonard D. Jackson Community Center and the Edith Throckmorton Neighborhood Park which was redesigned in 2022.

In recent years, residents of Kensington, Ken-Gar, and surrounding neighborhoods have advocated for greater connectivity and improved safety for pedestrians, public transit riders, and cyclists. After years of work toward meeting these principles, the Montgomery County Council recently adopted a new General Plan, Thrive Montgomery 2050 (*MontgomeryPlanning.org/planning/master-plan-list/general-plans/thrive-montgomery-2050/*), a Bicycle Master Plan (*MontgomeryPlanning.org/*





planning/transportation/bicycle-planning/) and a Pedestrian Master Plan (*Montgomeryplanning. org/planning/transportation/pedestrian-planning/pedestrian-master-plan/*) with a focus on safer streets, sidewalks, pathways, and greater connectivity.

With the adoption of Thrive Montgomery 2050 and the above-mentioned Master Plans, the Town perceived a major opportunity to reimagine the Summit Avenue Extension as a neighborhood main street that bridges communities, and that with proper visioning, engagement, planning, and design, the new roadway can help to provide safe pedestrian access, improve environmental benefits, and jumpstart equitable, mixed-use housing and development in the northwest quadrant of the Town.

In this spirit, the Town of Kensington convened a two-day Technical Assistance Panel (TAP) facilitated by the Urban Land Institute (ULI) in July 2023 to evaluate the proposed Summit Avenue Extension through the lens of this broadened conceptualization of the project. The Panel toured the study area, met with Town Council members to ask questions about the assignment, and interviewed over two dozen stakeholders who were invited to participate. Using this information, the Panel coalesced an overall strategy for the area and developed a series of recommendations for the proposed Summit Avenue Extension project. The overarching conclusion from the ULI TAP report is that the Summit Avenue Extension provides an opportunity to create a more walkable community that better connects Ken-Gar to the Town of Kensington, as well as bridges west and east Kensington across Connecticut Avenue. Creating an alternative north-south roadway to reroute a portion of the traffic from Connecticut Avenue will provide some congestion relief, but more importantly, becomes the catalyst for reimagining a new, more walkable corridor connecting Ken-Gar and Kensington.

The new roadway, if designed with Complete Streets principles in mind [*MontgomeryPlanning.org/planning/transportation/complete-streets/*], can prioritize pedestrian and bicycling access and safety. Wide sidewalks, street trees, bike lanes, linear parks with trees and greenspace to reduce urban heat-island effects and stormwater runoff, and shorter distances between controlled pedestrian



crossings can transform the extension into a walkable neighborhood street with desperately needed new housing rather than simply being a bypass of Kensington's Town Center.

In addition to the mobility benefits, the Summit Avenue Extension can unlock opportunities for infill housing and economic development. New residential development along Summit Avenue could create a transitional neighborhood between Ken-Gar's single-family homes and future commercial development on Connecticut Avenue. To catalyze mixed-use redevelopment, the project can leverage development principles from Thrive Montgomery 2050 to allow increased residential density and reduced caps for commercial uses, which are currently overallocated. Incentives for land assemblage and parking consolidation would also aid coordinated development. In addition, the Summit Avenue Extension creates an opportunity for the County to partner with the Kensington Volunteer Fire Department (KVFD) to redevelop or relocate KVFD's aging fire station within the project area while colocating it with additional community facilities and uses, such as affordable housing.

It is important to note that area residents and business owners have expressed concerns about residential and commercial displacement already occurring in and around the project area and the potential impacts of the project. In particular, many Ken-Gar residents are facing market pressures that might make legacy and generational ownership more difficult with the proposed project. Therefore, it is essential to use the Summit Avenue Extension project as an opportunity to pilot innovative programs, such as the establishment of a Community Land Trust, negotiated community benefits for impacted residents, and other County and Town supported initiatives, to help alleviate some of these pressures. This will require a meaningful community engagement process to ensure that the benefits of redevelopment are equitably planned for and realized.

While much more engagement with the community is planned around this project, the ULI TAP report presents a broadened vision for the Summit Avenue Extension. The project opportunities far exceed just traffic alleviation. The Town has a major opportunity to reimagine the Summit Avenue Extension as a neighborhood main street that espouses our principle of being a wonderful place to live, work, and visit by bridging communities rather than dividing them. With proper planning and design, the new roadway can increase connectivity between the Town's fragmented communities, provide safer pedestrian access, and jumpstart equitable, mixed-use redevelopment in the heart of Kensington.

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Recycling in Kensington is collected on Tuesdays only. Each single-family and town home received a large, wheel-based, blue container for recycling in January 2011. The recycling (blue) bin is intended for recyclables only. The Town collects recyclables through a single-stream method, meaning that all recyclable materials may be placed within the recycling bin.
